Children's Easter Books







I especially like the one that shows the three crosses from a distance for younger children. For Baby through Kindergarten.





Each two-page layout features a sub-title with supporting Bible verses listed. On the bottom of the page, a question or explanation provides an opportunity for interaction between the reader and the child. I like the content but the Illustrations are cartoonish and stereotypical. 2-5 years.





He learns that eating all the Easter candy doesn't cure his hurting heart. The story of Easter helps him find hope and learn what he can do for his sister. Ages 4-7.

The Easter Stranger by Nicole E. Dreyer, illustrated by Len Ebert, 2009, Arch Books. Part of the series Learning Bible Stories is Fun with Arch Books. This book tells the story of Jesus on the road to Emmaus from Luke 24:1-35. Ages 5 and up.
